New Zealand improved to 11th ranking in the women's world orienteering championships in Hungary over the weekend.

The men's relay team finished 20th and for the first time defeated Australia, when one of its members, Warren Key, was disqualified.

Anitra Dowling of Dunedin was the best New Zealand woman performer, finishing 19th in the qualifying race on Friday in 55m 59s, only 11 minutes behind the winner, and coming 44th in the individual world championship on Saturday in 1h 49m 47s.

The top performer among the New Zealand men was national champion Ross Brighouse of Waiuku, who was 30th in the qualifying event, only 15m 24s behind the

winner.

As expected, Norway dominated the championships taking the first four places in the men's event, although it finished only fourth in the woman's championship won Sweden.
